Live closer together in the city. Plant closely and densely together. Protect open space for all species. Summon individual and collective creative forces to move toward creative solutions for survival.

THE SURVIVAL GARDEN is not a romantic garden (although it could be that, too).

This is not a manifesto to plant alone, in an isolated private garden, but to plant as a citizen, to plant as art, as a creative force, to plant publicly, to plant communally.

This is a manifesto to plant NOW. It is a call to immediate action.

We have reached peak points in multiple environmental disasters;
each a cause and effect of the other. Work now, starting at any point.

Start where you are standing, think, and move forward with intent, with others.

Act locally AND globally together.

PRACTICING ART WITH INTENT

See like an artist, who sees not one shade of green, but thousands of variations on the theme of green. Look for minute details and the big picture.

THE WAR OF DISTRIBUTION
Patriarchal Colonization vs. Ecofeminist Theory

It is hard to escape analogies of war—dominant patriarchal theories that analyze how we live and die.

Ecofeminist theories seek horizontal alignment, not vertical power structures.

This manifesto reflects ecofeminist deep ecology theory.

This is not "women as mother earth" theory.

This ecofeminist theory seeks social and ecological justice for all people, all species, and all life. Ecofeminists struggle against patriarchal power structures that treat people, animals, and resources as property to be bought, sold, and dominated. This is a fight against discrimination and unequal distribution of life essential resources. While hundreds of species go extinct by the minute, a few select powers control the distribution, quality and quantity of deteriorating, diminishing, endangered natural resources—AIR, WATER, LAND, FOOD—for rest of the planet.

There are ways for local communities to organize to take control of the distribution and quality of regional water, land, food, and even air.

GREENING PUBLIC SPACE = GREEN ECONOMICS = GREEN JOBS
A CALL TO GARDEN IN PUBLIC FOR THE PUBLIC AND INDIVIDUAL GOOD:

Healthy organic sustainable food is a human right
Land use must be for the good of all life—not just humans,
but plant/animal/air/water
Survival of human species depends on collaboration, cooperation,
and civic involvement in cleaning the air, cleaning the water, and
protecting food sources for all.

CANTO IX.

PUBLIC ART ACTIONS

PLANT a roof. PLANT every roof on one street.
PLANT the medians, alleys, vacant lots where you live.
PLANT every balcony in a high-rise building.
TAKE OUT a lawn. Take out more lawns.
TAKE OUT concrete, asphalt, barriers to growth.
IFAVE THE ROSES.

PLANT food crops in laundry baskets, filing cabinet drawers, garbage cans, stacks of tires, abandoned cars.

No space is too small or too large.

PLANT healthy organic food in every vacant space.

IMITATE NATURE which plants seeds in minute pockets of soil collecting in crevices and cracks of Crumbling walls, sidewalks, old bricks, and between the rocks.

IMITATE NATURE. Forget the chemicals.
Use the sun and the wind and the power of water.
COLLECT YOUR OWN SEEDS. Share them. Exchange them.
PLANT to replenish soil, protect the rivers, feed, and be fed.

IMITATE NATURE. Be inspired. Clues are everywhere.
Circumvent a barrier,
Recreate the conditions for life,
SOLVE AND PLANT FOR LIFE.

LIVE CLOSE TO EACH OTHER. Cherish open space. Save other species. We are dependent on their survival. NURTURE YOUR NEIGHBORS.

TURN OFF THE LIGHTS AT NIGHT. SEE THE STARS. IMAGINE THE UNIVERSE.

PLANT so that your city disappears.
